The **International Dialogue on Peacebuilding and Statebuilding** is a partnership between the governments of 20 countries affected by conflict and fragility (g7+), development partners (OECD-DAC INCAF) and civil society (CSPPS). The IDPS is the architect behind the *New Deal for Engagement in Fragile States* – a call to action for different ways of operating in fragile and conflict-affected environments, which prioritises effective peacebuilding and statebuilding and country ownership and leadership.

For the last 10 years, the IDPS has served as a platform for mutual accountability, frank and open exchange, lesson-learning and sharing to promote effective support to country owned and country led, inclusive peacebuilding and statebuilding. Replicating at country level, the regular and sustained global level dialogue, has been a challenge. To overcome this, in 2017, Sierra Leone stepped forward and agreed to pilot a country dialogue process.
